It has occurred to me  
that I have been committing  
a grievous negligence in not  
at once reporting to you on  
an antiquarian find of mine.

However it was only made  
the week before last, when,  
in walking across some fields  
of a railway-station, I came  
on what seemed undoubted



evidence of a British Earthwork,  
though ignored on the Ordnance  
Maps, & as far as I can find,  
entirely unrecorded.

I had little time to spare  
when I first saw it, but  
revisited it last week, with  
Mr. Shore (of Hartley Inst.),  
when I was able to trace the  
whole circuit, though at one  
part nearly everything had  
been ploughed away.

It is about  $\frac{1}{3}$  mile in  
circumference, on slight hill  
about a mile W. of Limbridge  
Station (on line of Salisbury),  
on S. side of stream, & at a  
gravel where <sup>the stream</sup> flows close to  
that bank. The hill slopes  
westward also, & also southward  
a very little way from the  
Caput. The site is therefore  
a good one.
