Dear General

I have written to J. F. & received
a reply therefore about the Kennoway
"Fort". My friend (Mr. J. W. Kirkby) says
that the material is evidently soft
stuff, being the northern end of a
ridge of Drift (clay (below) and
gravelly stuff (above) - which latter
has been termed 'Valley-gravel' here.
These ~~two~~ materials are not visible
at the "Fort" itself, but by rise of
the burn (Kennoway Burn) at a short
distance to the South, where the
line of division of the dry porous
deposit (above) & the damp clay (below)
is well marked". Therefore the "Fort"

is probably composed of gravelly
material. It is "scarped," but
as I did not go up it, I cannot
say if it be so equally all round.

Please accept my best
thanks for your hospitable offer
to enable me to see the old
pit-village &c. I shall be heavily
occupied with examinations (military)
in the middle of January, and must
therefore decline accepting your
very kind invitation - with regret.
