Dear Sir

I was glad to receive your  
letter on the subject of ancient  
monuments. I think that a local  
society can do no better service than  
by endeavouring to abrogate the act  
for the preservation of monuments.  
The machinery now exists but it can  
only be worked by pressure from without.  
What we understand by Government  
in this country is a body amenable to  
pressure. The act as you kindly recites



only at present to prehistoric monuments,  
but there is nothing in it that I  
can see to prevent Roman ~~and~~ or  
even medieval monuments from being  
included of the owner's wish. And  
the willingness of parties can be  
induced to accept them. The cost  
as you know is purely nominal,  
and nothing can be done without the  
owner's consent. The owners of monuments  
as a rule are not archaeologists. They  
are generally willing to preserve  
their own monuments themselves &  
having done so very efficiently but they  
despise government interference &  
they have no inducement to accept  
themselves of the act. It has not been

without much trouble that I have  
persuaded about half the owners of  
the scheduled monuments to do so.  
If the Hampshire Field Club  
considers any monument in the  
county to be worthy of protection  
and will induce the owner to  
offer it, I shall be very happy to  
forward the <sup>proposal</sup> ~~matter~~ and I have  
no doubt that with a strong  
recommendation from a local scientific  
society it will be done. But the  
archaeological societies have not been  
as active in the matter as could  
be wished.

## HAMPSHIRE FIELD CLUB.

MEETING AT SILCHESTER AND BASING,  
THURSDAY, MAY 20th, 1886.

*Directors*—REV. G. N. GODWIN, B.A., T. W. SHORE, F.G.S.

Meet at Basingstoke Station at 9.52, by the Train leaving Southampton 8.45, Winchester 9.16, Bournemouth 7.3, Andover Junction 8.24, Waterloo 8.5.

Proceed by the 10.5 Train (G.W.R.) to Mortimer, arriving at 10.20.

Walk to Silchester, 2 miles—The remains of the Amphitheatre of the Roman City—Enter the walled enclosure on the site of the East Gate—The walls of the city, about 1½ miles in circuit, will be examined in various parts—Geological investigation of the bonding stones placed between the layers of flint nodules of which the walls are chiefly built—The analysis of the Roman mortar.

The foundations of the Basilica and the outline of the Forum—The foundations of the Round Temple—The South Gate and its masonry—The site of a Roman guardroom.

The fosse outside the walls, and the remains of the Celtic or pre-Roman fortifications.

Silchester Museum, containing specimens of Roman pottery and other articles found during the excavations. A small charge is made for entrance to the Museum, the receipts from which are for the benefit of the poor of the parish.

\*Silchester Church—Early English and Transition Norman work—The remains of Roman stonework probably used partly in its construction.

The walk to Silchester and around its walls will afford a good opportunity for the botanical study of the district.

Return to Mortimer for 3.4 train to Basingstoke arriving at 3.20.

Members are recommended to leave Silchester for this train not later than about 2.15.

Interval for Luncheon at the Railway Refreshment Rooms.

Leave Basingstoke Station about 4.20. Walk to Basing, 2 miles. Parties of four or five can, if they wish to do so, hire conveyances at Basingstoke Station to and from Basing. The ruins of Old Basing House will be visited (by permission)—Evidence of Celtic fortification at Old Basing.

The Rev. G. N. Godwin, B.A., author of the History of the Civil War in Hampshire, 1642-44, will describe the long siege and final capture of Old Basing. If time permits visit Basing Church.

Return to Basingstoke for the trains leaving for Southampton and Winchester at 7.15, Andover 7.20, Waterloo 6.55. Members who walk are recommended to leave Basing for the 7.15 train not later than about 6.25.

THE JOURNEY.—Arrangements will be made for the party from Southampton to travel to and from Basingstoke for 1½ fare 3rd class, 3/4. Members passing through Southampton or Bishopstoke can join in this arrangement if they wish, but they must in every case give notice to the Honorary Secretaries. The whole party will be allowed to travel from Basingstoke to and from Mortimer at 1½ fare 3rd class (10d.), but as it is necessary to know beforehand how many tickets will be required, the names of those who wish to take these tickets must be sent in to the Honorary Secretaries.

Members of the Club residing in and near Winchester, Bournemouth, or elsewhere, are reminded that Double Journey Tickets at 1½ fare are granted by the L. & S.W.Ry. Co. for excursion parties on application some days before the intended journey. Members should communicate with the Honorary Local Secretaries on the subject.

REFRESHMENTS.—The charges at the Refreshment Rooms, Basingstoke Station, are as follows:—Plate of cold meat and bread, 1s. 1d.; mutton chop and bread, 1s.; steak and bread, 1s. 1d.; tea and bread and butter, 6d.; cup of tea, 3d.; and other refreshments at tariff prices. Those who wish to have chops or steaks should give notice in the morning to the Manageress of the Refreshment Rooms in order for a supply of these refreshments to be provided by her.

## HAMPSHIRE FIELD CLUB.

### RULES,

Approved by the Club at the Selborne Meeting, June 25, 1885.

1.—That this Society be named "THE HAMPSHIRE  
FIELD CLUB," and that the object of the Club be the  
study of the Natural History and Antiquities of the  
County.

2.—That the Club consist of ordinary members and  
honorary members.

3.—That the annual subscription payable by each  
ordinary member be five shillings.

4.—That scientific men of distinction, non-resident in  
the County, may be proposed and elected as honorary  
members of the Club, at any meeting of the Committee,  
such honorary members not to exceed twenty-five in  
number.

5.—That ladies be eligible for election as members  
of the Club.

6.—That the subscription of ordinary members be  
due in advance, and be paid at or before the first  
meeting of the Club in each year, and that the name of  
any member in arrear for one year be removed from  
the list of members.



7.—That the Head-Quarters of the Club be at Southampton.

8.—That the Government of the Club be vested in a Committee, to be elected annually, and to consist of the President, the two Honorary Secretaries, one of whom shall act as Treasurer, and not less than six other members.

9.—That three be a quorum of the Committee.

10.—That the Committee be empowered to appoint Local Secretaries for any part of the County, who shall be ex-officio members of the Committee.

11.—That persons who are members of any recognised Scientific Society, publishing proceedings, be eligible for admission as members of the Club without ballot, and that other persons, having been duly proposed and seconded by two members of the Club, be elected to the Club by the ballot of the Committee.

12.—That the proposer of any candidate be required to state the particular branch of Natural History or Antiquities in the study of which any candidate for admission into the Club is engaged, or is interested, or any other qualification, or special line of study.

13.—That in order for any such candidate to be elected a member of the Club, the ballot by the Committee be unanimous.

14.—That the Club hold not less than four ordinary field meetings in each year.

15.—That an annual meeting for general business be held in the early part of each year.

16.—That the financial report of the Club be brought up at the annual meeting in each year.

17.—That any member of a recognised Scientific Society, publishing proceedings, be eligible to attend any field meeting of the Club as a visitor, on the introduction of a member of the Club.

18.—That each member of the Club be at liberty to introduce one visitor (who may not be a member of any recognised Scientific Society) to each field meeting of the Club, but not the same visitor more than once in any one season.

19.—That members of the Club who do not attend any meeting, after they have given notice of their intention to attend, be liable for their share of any expense which may be incurred by the Committee in connection with such meeting.

20.—That the Club discourage the practice of removing and rooting up rare plants from characteristic localities, and the extermination of rare birds, and also use its influence with landowners for their protection.

21.—That the Club use its influence to promote the preservation of objects of antiquity.
