Dear Sir

In returning you the accompanying forms, I take the opportunity of asking whether you can bring before the Council the question of investigating before it is too late, the barrow near Parliament Hill at Hampstead. The plot in which it is now certain to become pleasure grounds under the Met. Board of Works and all chance of examining the barrow which I believe has not been examined, will be lost soon. I asked Mr. Franks by letter some considerable time ago if he would move in the matter, but got no answer.

No. 2. With regard to the barrow near Parliament Hill. It is of course difficult to prove a negative but such evidence as there is points to the barrow having been undisturbed for the last 100 years. The Gait's Mag. for 1776 p. 169 describes some Roman Remains dug up near the Wells at Hampstead but is silent after that date as to excavation or discovery at Hampstead. Park in his history of Hampstead in 1814 has no mention of any such. The first growing on the barrow can hardly be younger than those planted at the beginning of this century near the Spaniards on the hawthorn hedge which until lately surrounded the site of the barrow was of hardly less age, without showing any trace of disturbance. Professor Hales drew attention to the barrow (which was already noticed by Stennett in his "Northern Spyglass" in 1869) recently in the Athenaeum for 1883 page 634 suggesting its examination. His letter called out others from Elliott Stock and from Gomme in particular but no mention was made by any one of any examination having ever taken place. Elliott Stock I think mentions a belief (which doubtless would help to keep the barrow intact) that it was a burial place for those who died of the plague. Yours sincerely
