Boltinga has just had a good face of rain. I have also had a good face & the drought has very apparently made to my advantage for I have held discussions of a prolonged drought such as the old Negro slave as living around years before the advent of the Phil. man in Cuba where when a little drought improved upon us was the only water left anywhere in the Alca Yunque locality. Negro haddins used to leave with a man or two of us - but I am inclined to think that the situation is changed to some extent.
