

Moonta

28<sup>th</sup> Oct 1903

My dear Spencer

Tell me, is it 45 or 46 that I am today? It's a horrid memory! The trip to Moonta has done me good. I'm feeling better than I have felt for months. Poulton gave me some stuff which greatly modifies the pain. I'm now trying a new remedy, lime water taken internally three times a day. Mitchell MP for the Territory who has been a great sufferer for years declares that it cured him.

The arrangement with Dr Poulton is that I am to return to Moonta for the operation in three or four weeks when my wife has fully regained her strength.

I had a great go in with the Commonwealth man. He's a smart man & fully determined to justify his opposition by casting things to the ground whenever he can. Rose at 11<sup>th</sup> Adel is very near the end, poor old fellow is scarcely able to stand when he does the salary of his successor will be £250 or under so that my going there or in fact even leaving from Moonta is quite out of the question. I told the

Inspector that had been looking forward for years to securing an appointment in the City Service, that I had been promised the first vacancy & that it was a constant blow to me to realize that all hope of getting such a shift was out of the question. He went home disappointed but don't repeat this on the importance of uniform scale of compensation all over the Commonwealth. The fact of the matter is that these reductions are being made so as to bring the salaries down to the level of those paid on one of the other State Presidents I think. Well as I waited passed the N. Adm. Post Office on Sunday evening it took money, & complained & it made me know my task to find that my Seniority & long service was a blow to my getting it - Everyone politicians & friends in Boston are sick of the Commonwealth & if it could be undone the State would shuffle out quick & easily.

George Brown's office was called he says "very satisfactory" he returned to the pads with his wife & family on Monday. Didn't see him but found a letter here on my return.

I went visiting but saw Prof. Henderson & Dr. Gill. The latter has invited me to come over & see him together - George is out of hospital staying up in the hills with the Symons & I didn't see him. Paul Maurice I saw in the North Adm. Hospital laid up with a sore leg result of a broken leg of some years standing, the front fibula have apparently grown together. The Heaven Nation - are in a fog as to what is best to do - Ned Bryan has passed his 50th birthday - he lost it all the night before left town he has his vengeance against Gregory about his loss mainly from what he tells me Gregory hasn't treated him well. He probably now requires a rest of a month or perhaps 20 days & not expect any further help from him.

Tonkin goes to Town to sign bond on Monday; so far no fund raised will enable me to pay him \$6.00 a month but I am hoping that Gill will take himself & so much difficult to make it up to £2 per week. I could never raise the money if I could have remained in Town longer. It's the debts own trouble to the cost of the reading business even they are always engaged 10 days. Don't forget to send Gill your cheques. He is to come down here to lecture in a few months - Hope all is well with you all at Darley - Warren's garden is just delightful. I hope Sunday with him
