10th Sept 1897

My dear Spencer

I have just seen the Hamming
safely packed up & have arranged
for Wells to take it down on the
mail Habitot who is going down
milk road after it on the road
& deliver it to Horrocks at
Oodnallalla whence it will go
on to you by rail. I could not
risk sending the mule & appal 7
that I did so sat once sent for
& inconvenienced John the Rat Rat &
Nosey Bob who readily undertaken
the job - this particular Hamming belongs
to the Illatā (big pig-faced barrowary
rat) of Lymville on the Finke.

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represents an old man Illata
this peccanning - by parcels
post I have sent a few Containing
beasts they were also a small bottle
Containing Adoring ita grub in
Ialla stage - the Adoring ita like
all other grubs is commonly
called Wchchatty the word does
not belong to this locality & has
been imported from the Souther
it is a caterpillar from $1\frac{1}{4}$ to
 $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in length & finally turns
into a grey moth a common looing
there at present un procurable as
are the caterpillars which are only
found in good seasons for a
short time after rain - the caterpillar
goes onto the ground to Uchagua
then Isela & finally Maegna or
Moth - thanks for your splendid
letter I enjoyed reading it very

much, do you know I think you
have done me an injustice in
saying that I had informed you
the Amstla did not send their
Atos I do not remember ever holding
such an opinion & indeed I have
a distinct recollection of an
argument upon this subject which
occurred between myself & some
members of the Amstla Septⁿ who insisted
that these people did not send
their Atos - however I have gone on
to the master very fully during
the last few months & now there is
not a shadow of a doubt about
it - the relationship notes are simply
splendid you have got a magnificent
grasp of the whole far better than
I have & you have written it with
your usual lucidity. I have gone
through every line carefully & your

will find a far trifling error
corrected in the ~~long~~ badge of
Notes - There is one other error that
I forgot to mention last mail in
the Kuredarova notes you state that
the Raulchava would not be sheltered
if detected, this does not occur
in my notes here & it is not
correct, the Raulchava would be driven
just as readily as any other mouse -
I don't feel in the least up to
telling writing today; better Balfour
has had a severe illness through borrowing
upon a number of raw Cauliflower &
almonds we have had very little
meat for the last week, he is now
recovering - the copy of Nature
containing the Ingovara paper has not
come to hand was it posted?
I am anxious to see it in
cold print, probably some of the

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Australian papers would be glad
to reproduce it as Nature has
such a limited circulation and here
I have wrote last night asking what
I worked done with the Negatives
thanking me for my "valuable contribution"
to his paper, he made no reference
to our work except to say that you
had told him that you were "very
successful on his late trip" he is certainly
a splendid worker he says he will
be returning to England in January
troued like to know if I am likely to
be in town before he leaves - I have asked
him to send the Negatives on to you -
In a recent paper I read a private
letter from a missionary in the New
Hebrides to a Congregationalist in Adelaide in
which this paragraph occurs - "A young chief,
Namuli, who is one of the two that I believe
to be sincere in their profession of faith, whom

Mr Gray will no doubt remember, came to
me just the day before yesterday with
all the sacred stones that had come
to him as chief. These consist of stones
for making various kinds of fish come
into the bay, & of others for making
pigs numerous. Namuli said he would
not sleep than any longer, because he
had learned that they were of no use, &
he intended to hold to the teaching of
God that all these things in future
I did not even know that he had them
in his possession till he brought them to
me of his own accord" — What do
you think of this — Cheewanga surely
you will find some interesting matter
in this native notes & I am hoping that
at long last we have got to bed work
as to regards origin of Ironskunyga & how
man descended from the alchungas and
ancestors — the note dealing with this is

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Very brief but it represents some awful
wrestling some real hard graft and
an expenditure in bad language which
I will take 50 years of purgatory to
wash out - Yes I remember your theory
as to the Alchymist man this Chomiza &
I was not at all surprised when I found out
that you had bottomed on spray gravel, how
here so often been right in looking about
that I have come to regard your theories with
the greatest respect but on the matter of
eating the lobes article you are off the track
altogether - You will find amongst the notes
sufficient material to show conclusively that
the lobes is not eaten freely & that at certain
times it is scarcely & not eaten at all, if we
had appeared upon the scene a few hundred
years later I think the reduction would have
disappeared altogether - I have gone most
confidentially into this matter. Then I came up to
my neck forehead in blood since the mail

around & shall not have time to take
haemps of Churinga or pass Negalors
in time for the mail - You must
have nearly as many broads Churingas
as I have could you not get better
models there - I think now for that
The concentric circles are a derivation from
the Spurce which is clearly discernible
on some of the elects - My wife is strongly
inclined with the idea that we shall have
you with us for Christmas again, she says
she feels sure that we shall get a note
some day saying that you are coming. I
would like it above all things but I'm
afraid it is not possible, Mrs Spencer I
know would like it & it would require
the courage of a martyr to leave the
cosy quietus you depict in your last
letter where are you living? I do hope
the Transvaal will get through safely it
is a rather delicate concern to care about

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In the case you will find a small bag
of Arudartha to replace any that gets
broken off in transit - Your collection
must indeed look nice I envy you
the green neutral tinted mall am
whalebone which I shall never
be able to afford - Next mail I'll send
you some things including

OChnchbalanem a carnelian finger
ring to send to you up this
mail. I need a nice little addition
to my collection the other day
bought bag of dogroo skin containing
a lot of strong things & a set
none in number of Arunqallha
steel bones a dainty little lot
which evidently belonged to some
old Indian - They were dropped by
Niggers who were being chased for
cattle killing - I'd send them to you
to examine but if you don't get

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into that small case you could never
bring yourself to part with them -
I am especially rich in arnigquash
Heads & can let you have a couple
of the Govt. caribou sort & if you
want more I have not been able to
get out to the places mentioned in
my last letter there being no water at
either place - Shirley has not said
anything more about his proposal &
gants agree with you that if
the word is to be done simply
by people who are interested in
the ruggers without being amongst
them & possessing their entire confidence
it will be valuable - You know from
our own experience how extremely
difficult it is to make any headway
when you live amongst them &
possess their confidence - With respect
to Temp. Room I am not very

hopeful that I could do much more
out there in a week or two, in
the first place I don't know a
word of the language & the Piggies
thrust very little of me except that
I have conjugated a few of them
number to jail. I might run out
there for a week after rain falls
so let me assure you precisely what
information it is that you require
- Of one thing we are certain & that is
the local absence of class system &
another thing the absence of Mura
restrictions both of which escaped
Stirling - We cannot show exactly how
they regulate marriage but we do know
that the choice of a wife is not
restricted nor is it in the hands
- The relationships known are on all
four or nearly so but I do not
think they extend beyond certain

localities - I think we have got
much further than Stirring did
although he had Colle on the spot
to assist him - Marton has been
with us again & the next day
as a visit which will be not
later than Christmas he will bring
in a medium snow who is about
the most intelligent Negro on
Pempe & I'll either burn or get
something out of him - After
much weary waiting the Station
Master at William Creek has
arranged for an intelligent helot
to come & speak me on Sunday
when I hope to settle definitely
about the station entomology if
the entomologist succeeds in anything
satisfactory I'll get Byme to
enclose a memo in his letter
I have also written Koonpe asking

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him
to get the information & to enable
him to understand what I want. I
have given him a lot of information
about the organization of the traps.
"Of course you know so & so etc" But of
course he does not - I have made no great
effort to acquire this language but I am
picking it up gradually & understand it
much better than I can talk it. It's a
fair brat of a language - by the way
when asking for translation please say
where the terms are used - Wünfra
for instance, which means bad smelling, I
can't find anywhere in any notes - whenever
I can translate a lone or words and I
do so - You will find amongst the
photos one of a man striking a
spur on which the flint shows out
fairly well, This was the only one out
of three negatives in which the flint
was clearly discernible - None were good

to I at least I havnt seen any,
carrying a patchie on the head & one
child sitting aside the shoulders & another
across the hip - when carrying two children
the patchie is carried under the arm
as in one of the pictures by this man
- the two girls in the ~~per~~ same picture
are rather good looking but perfect
little spetfins for a week they were
fighting every day until both were
horribly battered about. ~~I have stopped~~
them on two or three occasions but
the gaundie always broke out again
next day until I, in my character
of medicine man, had this luck
one - Taking out a lump of sugar I
tang over it & powdered some on
to the head of each girl & then
dividing the remainder in two halves
made them hold it in their mouths
until dissolved. I then struck each

a tap on the back of the neck
I told them that if the gauntlet
was resumed they would be dead
in a month, since then there has
been no gauntlet & I have had two
applications for the ^{ilyima} ~~leprosy~~ treatment
the old Okirabata was greatly
impressed when he heard about it -
If the missionaries heard this they'd
set the dogs on to me the next time
I visited Hermansberg - The Peggors are
greatly concerned about Little Jack's illness
& the Okirabata & another black eyed old
rascal interviewed me yesterday about
bringing up a great medicine man who
has just arrived from the Bunt district -
I declined politely, pointing out that I too
was a great Raikouwa & referred them to
the Ironswings for a character. Since
then the old Kusun Luba has interviewed
the wife & told her that the old man

knows exactly what Jack is suffering
from that on a previous occasion when
Brian was ill he came to our bedroom
door & extracted the bone through
the fly hole - Delighted to hear that the
little Barren Ground is now Muddy
will hunt up information about & try
to get some more as soon as possible
I am out of Spirits of Wine but have
a bottle & half of the other stuff, it
is hopeless trying to find the big
Collecting box in a season like the
present, we are suffering from drought
& unless rain falls within three months
our sheep will be uncatable - The
Bulletin for today says that you
are to succeed McCoy at the Museum
& this so? pray look to that whale
and dont give your collection to
the institution. I was amused to read
Walters remarks upon the Chumiga

When you got from Mr. Bury, they are
characteristic of the man, the art - poverty
was traded from the South where
bags & nets were made in years
gone by the negroes also made nets of
grass fibers I have one which I think
you can, in fact I'm not sure that
I didn't give it to you - It's a little
depressing to think that the book will
have such a tiny limited circulation.
I am still hopeful though that you
will turn out to be wrong & I right.
This country will take about a dozen
Copies & you are pricing it on such
an attractive form that I shall be
very much surprised if I don't
command a large sale - the illustrations
of They go on a free hand, must
sell it - Would you like to send
some Chevigny home to Oxford or
to the Antwerp people, if so please

half a dozen or more send them
home in our joint names - Hasnt
it a great piece of land that no
one else ever thought of working
but these stones They always had
a peculiar fascination for me &
I shudder to think how little I must
have got to know about them
without your guiding brain - your
scathing brain - I never it would
have called abit if old Sterling
or Elymann had got in ahead of
us - by the way Elymann has only
just reached Ft Davis where he is
totally unknown They wired me for
a description of him the other day
for purposes of identification & to enable
him to operate on his bonding etc
- Next time I will send you the
tool used for making chiseling - just
now of opium will incise left in

I got several from an old fellow
out at Mt Hay & sat with him
for half an hour while he was
making a Churinga - terribly slow work
it was too - a Note I think no
Churinga more carefully made than
the stone one in having covering
which I gave you - Note again - A
man was killed at Bonds Springs
a few weeks ago for slading as miss
a woman - Unama to him - who had not
performed the final ceremony of
Uspunitchina at her husband's grave
his great offence was that he threw
away the Chimurinya which she was
making - No fear of a specimen breaking
up the Engnara if it once starts going
here. & I asked daily. At last I got them
thoroughly well in hand & could stop
anything of that sort quickly - Eldest via
Rat Rat several of the leather bags

including some from Andicura are
here & anxious to hold another
Ingnara but I have almost decided
to veto it - meantime they are
performing abmoaura ceremonies
which of course I am recording
with the Camera - by Jove this abmoaura
boy is a great throw in for the
old men & for their voices to fit
They also have to be separately
pronounced with Sutrasaura & you
will find the initiatory notes
further excluded & corrected (damn)
& some good notes on masking
of Medicine men - the evil eye
certainly does exist in some form
or other amongst the Northerns
Ispia but I have not been able
to get any information about it
except that ^{some men} ~~they~~ have the power
of charming their eyes & projecting

arungquitha by looking at people
 they wish to injure - What induced
 you to ask me by wire if Totems
 were ever changed. if that were
 possible it would upset a great part
 of our work - the question staggered me
 & I lost no time in getting to work
 on it & soon found that they were as
 I thought unchangeable - in fact the old
 men laughed at the idea although
 alcheringa even to whom every thing was
 possible ^{did so in our melanies} - yet I think the cannibalism of
 far back generations can be safely assumed
 this continual reference to men living upon
 their Totem ~~scarcely~~ points back to
 cannibalism. I am returning Natural Science
 with the manuscript you have every
 reason to be pleased with these remarks
 about the Narrator - Pray don't forget
 to send me Nature if you can get
 it in althorina and some Poorella

I send home for it. It was not possible to take a picture of the actual culling of the Steenbog boy as it was done after dark as it always is so that there is no hope of getting the real thing. I could stand the Anschutz also because I never could depend upon getting a picture in the middle of the plate - that confounded little instrument nearly turned me grey. By this mail I got up a new Thornton Beard Shutter which will give an exposure down to 80th part of a second. I'm sorry to say your old shutter is quite worn out - With the new Shutter I could have got the Kangaroos crowding on to the Wartpa splendidly - Have you discovered recent holes with Horrell & Fisher to what do they think of them? I apologize for the late post in Goliad it escaped

my notice the Negatos is not a good
one - Do you know that London appears
to have gone out of the market altogether
I have not been able to procure any since
you left here I am doing all my work
with Metol - Please make out a complete
list of all Negatos you require - if
you want one of Narramunga tree
go and get Sterling to go & get it
- I think there are two - from Baden
& Rome who still hold a lot of my
Negatos unless Sterling has taken charge
of them - I suppose you'll rage around
because the Bultha pictures are not
better but the legal was also execrable
I was fortunate to get pictures at all
under the Circumcision - I took a peice
of the operation but - there was nothing
on it - of course it had to be taken
maliciously & part after day legal
it is impossible to get pictures without
time exposure

pillar legend it is a garbled the man's
name was not Ruelpista I have a
curiosity connected with the had stone
wall send picture with conjectures
and more - Stirling certainly won't work
with me if his idea is carried out
unless you feel disposed to sever the
partnership - even then I don't think I
could work with him - rightly or wrongly
probably wrongly I've got it into my head
that I know more about this sort of work
than how to sift it than Stirling does
& having this feeling I couldn't work with
him: I don't think it sounds a bit concealed
for you to say that you & I should be
left out for Horace & Fison have already
publicly spoken of our work as the best
of its sort they have the advantage of
having an splendid starting point & a
wide acquaintance with the blacks in the

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interior. Someone has, for some months, been sending me the Sydney Anthropological Journal but I notice that it has stopped this month.

Where is Watt? It struck me that he might be sending it. How are those pictures you took of me with the beads? Turn out well. You haven't sent me a copy - my pictures are delightfully mounted - yours & mine - in a big album while yours are I suppose vegetating in a pigeon hole now - I think you have a little stone cutting knife amongst the things I gave you if not please let me know. The Aulstra is done with a flint flake & opaline quartz had it in from the May locality where I saw a splendid outcrop & clear indications that knives and flints had been chipped at the spot for hundreds of years - I am starting a couple of old ones on a Chemurinya & it will teach you as I am - you have the real thing - demonstrated - in the bones. I sent a

You long ago - I don't remember the break
to white battle you got here but will try to
get some for French to whom please
remember me most kindly it is distressing
to hear that his writing is getting worse I
don't think that possible - You will
remember a conversation we had with the
Neggers about lobes eating at the sugarworks
when a man of the Arakwala lolan said
he could eat anything at any time - it turns
out that he is Arakwala of Elonda (Marsdenia
leechardii) & can only eat the fruit sparingly
I took him some one day & he would eat
it - That is a mean old dog & you are
singularly generous if you forgive such a
glaring breach of good faith. I don't think
him capable of that sort of thing & it is
disgusting to think that a man in his
position would stoop so low. When I meet him
again I'll tell him what I think about it, if
I get a fair chance to break the subject

I should like much to have seen old Byrne
when he heard this. Whatever you may do he
will never forgive the old Garage - Garage in
very truth - I don't think it would be
necessary to use Horn's map if Waukele
does the work the one now being completed
by him & Geology Brown would be better
for our purpose. I know that he is eager
to fix it up & he would do it
so well that I do not think we could
do better than accept his offer - I am
not troubling him this mail although he
wrote last mail saying the R. Geog. Society

is called Alshana - I would give £50, poor
as I am, if I could have one little
word with you to discuss the Churinga
& other things I think we are fairly on
the road & if there is any hitch it is
owing to my incapacity for lucid
explanation - You say it sounds presumption
to question my last notes - though the Lord
has you did question them & I hope that
you will now hesitate to do so when you feel
that ~~we~~ we are not on solid ground —

Sacred Churinga does not please me but
I can offer no substitute for the word Sacred
Did I tell you in a previous letter that
Begum had received substantial promotions?
How I wish close I'm afraid you will
find this a more than usually disjointed
letter I am happy and out of sorts —

Your girls must be growing apace
you have not told me how they looked

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upon their return from England. I
was delighted to learn that the Duke
Members would not take part in the
Sabbath meetings. Bellows speech was
magificent it was more than that it was
generous he did full justice to the great
Empire ⁱⁿ which he is found to be a
unit, to the splendid qualities of
the English as a nation &c —
but what the are going on, you'd only
laugh, so good night I mean the very
kind regards to Mrs Spencer & tell her
that if you do run up off soon some
we shall take the greatest care of you
