& Care of the Aboriginal & Half Cast  
Inhabitants of the Province" & has  
been introduced in the Upper House  
by the Clif Secty & after some  
discussion referred to a Select  
Committee of Six or 7 members  
This Committee is now sitting & I have  
& they have sent me a copy of the  
bill with a request that I should  
study it & hold myself in readiness  
to be called to attend for  
examination. & I wish I could

the bill is an honest attempt to  
better the condition of the Aborigines  
but it is the work of a man

about the conditions of life in Central  
Australia - according to this bill no

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No person is permitted to employ a native without a written permit from a Protector. All Aborigines & Half castes are to be employed under written agreement. After getting the Protector's permit the employer & employee are to go before a J.P. who in his presence sign the agreement for a stated period not exceeding however to exceed twelve months. Any person who employs either Aboriginal or Half caste without permit & agreement is liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding £50 not less than £10 or to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months. Clause 19 provides that any person who being an employer of any female Aboriginal or Half caste carnally knows or attempts to know such female shall be guilty of a misdemeanor & on conviction shall be liable to imprisonment for a term not
