Dear General Pitt-Rivers,

I beg to thank you very
much for your kind expressions
of sympathy in the death of my
father -

I do not myself know but
little of Mr. Semples son but I
have heard ^{him} spoken favourably of
and Whittle who is churchwarden
of the parish writes me as follows today

" Boston & Chipton, can you recommend
" one to us for the present?"

Mr Semple would be a very
young man for a large Parish
and as yet his opinions can
scarcely be formed, the danger
is of a young man taking any
extreme views which may be
detractful to the Danishness,
the late Mr Semple was a man
of extreme views & did not care
to recognize the authority of his
Bishop - As to the Boston Rectory

as I cannot help thinking it will
some-day it would certainly be
better that the bones of the Duke
should be the Duke of the Living
or otherwise it may pass into
objectionable and troublesome hands,
of course it may be considered
whether, if you have any one you
wish to present to Dillond at
once an arrangement could not
be made by offering Mr Waterfall
Dorset now in exchange for Dillond
but still retaining the right of Duke
of Dorset so as to deal with it on
his death.
