Dear General Pitt-Rivers,

I found time was so very  
short that it was impossible to  
get a Solicitor who could do  
any good in the case of entering  
the Stately I therefore went to  
Winborne yesterday & had an  
interview with the Clerk to the  
Magistrates & took the necessary

steps to get the case adjourned  
until the 31<sup>st</sup> of January & I have  
no doubt you will hear from Stanley  
that this was done.

I have looked into the corrupt  
Practices Act & find section 12.  
was as follows (viz) "No payment  
"or contract for payment shall, for  
"the purpose of promoting or securing  
"the election of a candidate, be  
"made in account of bands of  
"music, torches, flags, banners,

"corkades, ribbons, or other marks  
"of distinction". I do not think  
therefore it would be safe  
to have tickets of colours as you  
mentioned as it would be a  
mark of distinction.
