Dear Sir,

When I saw you on
Thursday last I told you that I
could not promise you any reduction
of rent of any kind, then, in
accordance with the instructions
I had received from General Pitt
Rivers but I told you to consider
the matter and let me know your

decision as to the Jarow and if you could not do this whilst I was at Beree to do so in 3 or 4 days and I should be glad to convey anything you had to say to the General - I find you have told the General that you did not want so much taken off Deunings as I had promised and you now ask me to get all I can taken off, I do not recollect I have promised any sum at any time, in fact no sum was ever fixed on so I could not have promised it.

I have had such a severe cold I have had to keep in-doors since my return from Beree but as soon as I am able I shall go to Rushmore and shall then get a reply.
