General Pitt Rivers

Sir,

In justice to myself
I take the liberty of writing
to tell you that I have
been obliged to withdraw
my offer for Manor Farm
Cheselborne, owing to the
following circumstances.
After receiving a letter
from Mr Creach saying

you had fixed the rent
to me at £315 per annum,
I met him at Skomunoko
by appointment, & then
practically took the
farm at above rent,
I promised me a letter
within one or two days
to give me authority to
enter on the farm.
The next letter I received
from him, after more
than a fortnight's delay,
was to inform me that
you had made a
mistake of £30 per year,
since withdrawing
my offer, I have not had

a word of explanation
from Mr. Creech; & I cannot
think there must
have been some misunderstanding
standing; after you had
given your word that the
rent was fixed at £315
per year, & which is the
outside value of the farm.
I am still prepared to
take the farm as originally
agreed between us, but
under the circumstances,
I had no
alternative but to
withdraw my offer. I
