I am in receipt of your favor ordering punch & medals, but on examining the medal dies I find the obverse very much rusted & before endeavouring to alter it I thought it best to send you impression & ask instructions - If the rust is ground out while the die is hard it will lower the relief of the skull &c., which will

detract from its appearance -
We can soften the die, take out the
rust marks & deepen the work again,
which would be the most perfect
way - Or we can leave it as it is
& avoid incurring expense, if you
do not consider the effect offensive
