I enclose photograph of the engraved pewter dish mentioned to Mr Long on Friday last. It has round the border four subjects, Shy hunting, fox hunting, coureing, and hare hunting. The men are in costumes of the time of James II. At the back is the mark of a pewterer who worked in London in 1685 according to Mr. St. John Hope.

It measures 27 ins in diameter, and is by far the finest English piece I have ever seen. If you would like it sending I will put it in a case for your inspection. Price is £12.10.0. I sold this dish to St. Dawson Tait many years ago for £14 or £15. and repurchased it with
