My dear Mr. Green,

I enclose a Notice
in triplicate to the Sanitary
Authority of the District of the
Gosport Union, relative to the
deviation of the road near Rushmore,
also the plan, and form of consent
to the deviation being made thro'
General Pitt Rivers' land. Of course
it will strike you that the General
being the maker of the new road,
his consent might well be assumed,
but the statute is very express that
this consent must appear under the
hand of the consentor and it has
been expressly held that no
signature by Agent or Solicitor is
sufficient. Moreover in another case
which has come under my view, and
where the circumstances were precisely
the same as in the present one the
express consent was required. All this
by way of anticipation of a natural
