I am collecting my notes
upon the Boy's Kilm
with the help of
my wife's artistic power to

our next year's Proceedings
I found the section of a
pottery wheel of Remond
Shale some pre-neolithic
but similar to the one
in the County Museum from
the Sand Kilm in the Barren
the Sand Kilm in the Barren
Instead of cutting
through a section of Coombe
Ditch during my own holiday
he completed the excavation
of a barrow on a parallel ridge
not far from the Kilm. I
managed to get it done
in your plan & drove the

excavation from the north
side to beyond the coombe
& on the natural floor bed
found no less than 15 skins
each of them full of burnt
bones the two principal ones
covered by each by a large flat
paved stone. There were several
unworked - natural? - flints
mixed up with the earth
immediately surrounding the
urns, which had been loosely
used as tools - as if the ashes
of the dead had scarcely
emerged from the earliest
state of barbarism at all
events the interments were
evidently of the neolithic
age perhaps simple. I have
4 entire urns; I hope to
rebuild 4 more, which probably
to finish I preserved the fragments
