I should much like to  
have your opinion about

to render the discovery  
useful to the advancement

of prehistoric studies  
and researches.

I must say that this  
photo conveys but a  
very insufficient idea  
of the object itself. The  
original stone must be  
examined; then only  
can any one perceive the  
unmistakable traces  
of man's intentional  
handiwork, in the fine  
chippings and carvings.

The absence of patina  
and oxide of any kind

would be explained  
by the sojourn of the  
stone in saline water.

I should be most  
happy to send the  
stone for your inspection  
at your own convenience.

I had written to the  
editor of an Archaeolo-  
gical Paper, but am  
advised to seek  
the opinion of an eminent  
specialist first, previous  
to any notice from the
