

Per rail to Finsbury Station paid.

It was taken from 18 to 26  
inches below surface - the alluvium  
varies from 12 to 78 inches, and  
some of pottery was taken from  
apparently ~~that~~ pot-holes  <sup>at various</sup>  
but nothing perfect.

The best thing perhaps is a  
cinerary urn of red earth rudely  
patterned with triangular markings  
made prob: with a pointed stick

Size about 6 in - width 7. <sup>4 in high</sup> and  
a black earth rude pipkin - both  
both imperfect & I had to piece
