she died in 1853.

little I can make
out of antiquities, to
support me. I have been
patronised by the
late Earl of Derby,
Hon. Col. Gaton, of
the Grenadier Guards,
who has in his
possession two ^{distinct}
copies which originally
came from me. I
belong to a Suffolk
family, born in 1785,
John Lane, in or near
Walton Colney, father,
John Lane, born
at Harwich, Essex,
1809. I, at Liverpool

in 1833, and am sorry
to say, through even
fifteen years illness, have
been very much put
to in pulling out
an existence. Various
members of our
family served in
various positions
under Government,
My grandmother
Mary Crisp, nee
Love, was well
known to Sir
Charles Blount
Tutton, as ^{Miss} ^{Miss} ^{Miss}
Adel confidant
servant.
