

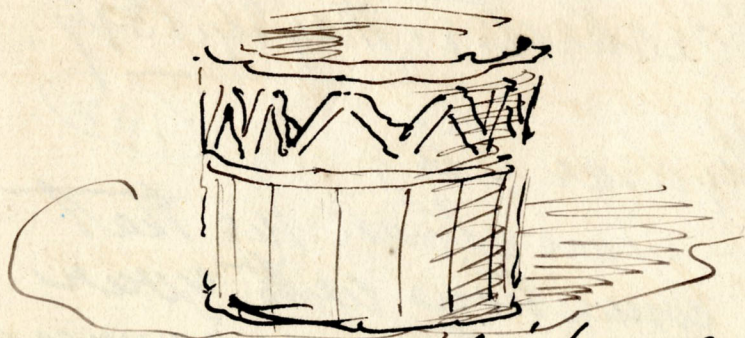

My dear Sir,

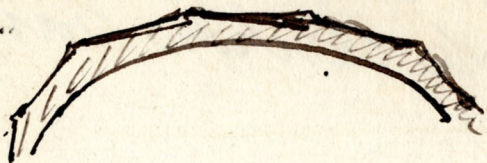
It has struck me that  
in connection with your  
study of chevron ornament  
you may like to have a  
sketch of a fragment of  
pottery which as far as I  
know you have not seen:  
With great trouble I built  
up out of bits which were  
received from the late Dr.  
Smart enough of the ware  
to show that it was about  
18" high and no less than  
this some in width. From  
it, just below the rim, is  
a single chevron band -



This gives a slight idea of it. The lower part is of roughly polygonal plan produced by the outer surface having been roughly flattened so as to produce level bands meeting in angles.

I am respectfully aware that I am making a lame description of this fragmentary urn.

The plan of the lower portion would be something like this



If you care to have a slight sketch I shall be happy to make one. But please let me know soon as I suspect to be leaving home in June.

By the bye I have just heard of the former existence of more than 100 holes or hollows on Poundbury Farm, about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile from the camp and ten from the great cattle farm. Some of them are still to be perceived in spite of ploughing.
