Dear Sir

I hope you will excuse my troubling  
you in a matter where we should be  
glad to have the benefit of your skilled  
opinion. In digging the foundations for  
a new wing to the Sanatorium at Marlborough  
College, we have come upon a series of  
large urns or vases; some seven or  
eight have been discovered, and it  
is reasonable to suppose that there are  
others in the adjacent undisturbed soil.  
These are of a pottery which I have been  
accustomed to regard as Early British; thin  
in proportion to their size, <sup>grey or</sup> clay-colored, and  
containing numerous particles of quartz(?);  
shaped somewhat thus ; some are

ornamented externally, the handiest having  
two rows of a zigzag pattern, thus,



a row of roundish impressions beneath these,  
and near the rim a raised moulding of  
confluent roundish impressions marked with an  
incised pattern, something thus,



I am writing from memory, but I think  
this is sufficient to give you a general  
idea. Apparently there was no trace  
of interment in these, but two or three  
bones of animals (not so far as can be  
identified) were found in or near them.  
The only other article found apparently  
in connection with these is a piece of

the base of a deer's antler, with a  
round hole about an inch in diameter  
neatly drilled through it. The excavation  
is proceeding, and we shall endeavour to  
find out what is in the soil before it  
is finally built on, but this must  
be done at once.

We should be very grateful therefore  
if you could inform us what the  
character of these remains is; what  
we ought to look for in connection with  
them; and any recommendations that  
you might feel disposed to make in  
the interests of archaeology. It does  
not seem possible to get the vessels  
out whole, even with the greatest care,  
as they fall to pieces when the earth is
