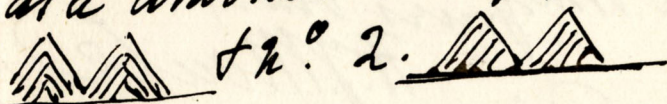


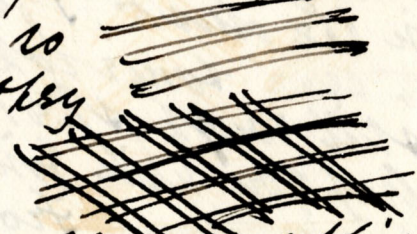
Dorchester. Sept. 21. 1864.

My dear Sir,

Pray excuse a second letter. It seems to me needful to send it in correction of mine of yesterday. Today, on verifying what I then said partly from memory, partly from inspection in the dusk, I feel that I ought to send somewhat better, though still rough sketches. Overleaf you will find them, with two rubbings. From one of these & the accompanying sketch you will see, I think, that one of the bands of ornament which I described as triple zig-zag is really a band of chevron, and chevron which may be described as a combination of your n^o. 1.

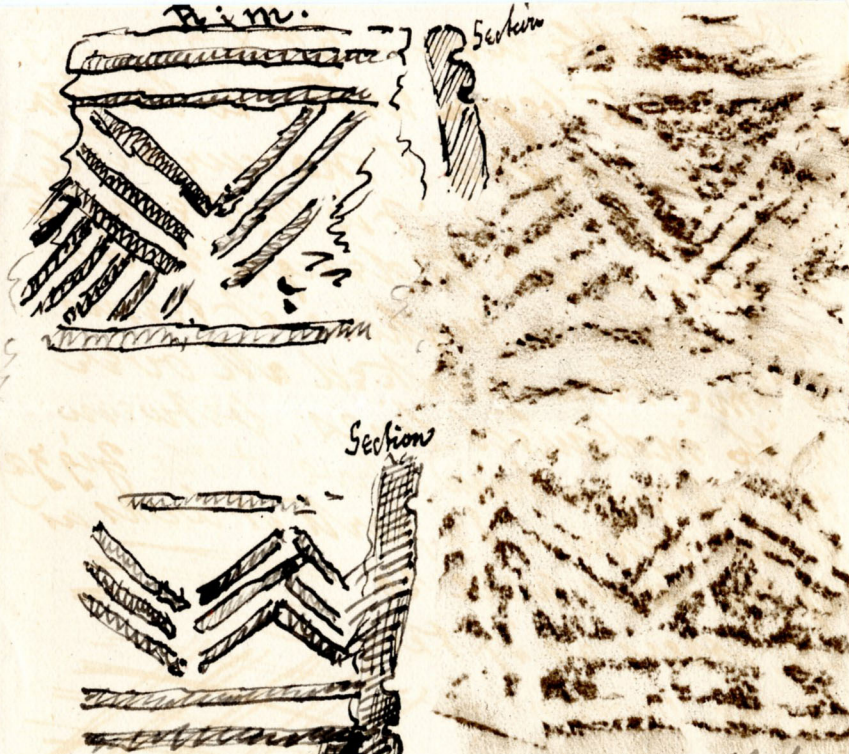


This little urn - 5 in. X 5 in. - is so made to begin with, so broken, and so roughly & inaccurately mended, that it is not easy to be sure what its design was originally. Anyhow it seems to have been marked all over with indented lines, between the chevron-band above & the zigzag band below - In parts it looks as if the lines were so - in others as if they were crossing.



I cannot but think that this urn is worth your inspection when next you are at Dorchester. I do not remember your noticing it on any occasion when I have had the pleasure of seeing you here. I am yours truly
