craniometer - The latter  
appears to do its work  
very satisfactorily -



The finding of decapitated  
✓ possibly of a hanged  
skeleton in ~~Worbarrow~~ is  
curious. In the *Crania*  
*Britannica* something of  
the sort is recorded re-  
specting White Horse Hill.

The very tall man  
(skull no 7) whom you  
conjecture to have been  
hanged, has an Anglo-Saxon  
look in the vertical &  
lateral aspects at least -  
No 13, also a tall man,  
has less of that appearance

except perhaps in the facial  
aspect - I don't think  
the skull from the pit  
near Handley Hill has  
at all a horse age look,  
do you? -

As you say, the  
stephanic breadth is important,  
but not easy to fix - I  
find it useful even in  
the living head, where any-  
thing like accuracy is  
impossible - Of all  
measurements it appears to  
me to be the one which  
has most relation to the  
general intelligence of people -
