it relates to
"Camps". I thank

Here we in Scot-
land a large
number of "Camps"
popularly believed
to be Roman mainly
on the ground
of their rectangu-
lar form. Some
of them are probab-
ly Roman; some
I have a theory

of suspicion, are ca-
losures of some
kind, raised at a
late date than
the Roman period,
while some are very
puzzling. Because
Roman Camps were
usually square
or oblong, it does
not necessarily
follow that all
enclosures of that
kind are Roman
Camps. This you
have clearly shown.
