I should say that a building
constructed to hold 50 chairs
would answer
the purpose nicely. Some
who are not members of
the Church of England would,
I think, be glad to attend
our services. I cannot
suggest a better place for
such a building than the
neighbourhood of your
new gates.

In order that the building
might be used for sacred
as well as secular purposes

I would ask that a space
of (say) eight feet in length
at the East end of the
building might be railed
off as a Chancel and
divided from the remainder
of the room by a wooden
screen which could be
drawn back in time of
divine service. The remainder

available for other purposes.
