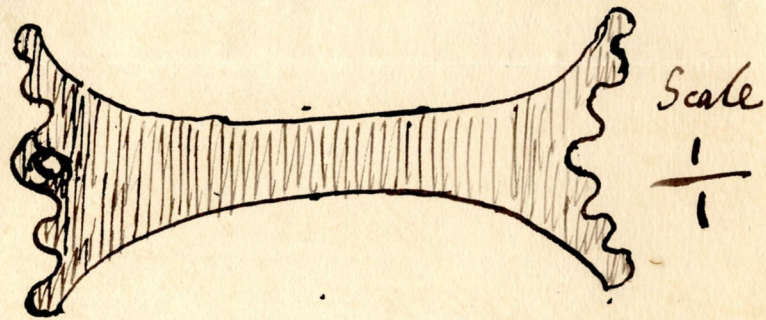


My dear Sir,

After troubling you so lately with letters I hesitate greatly about writing now. Yet it seems a quasi duty to tell you of a matter which may perhaps interest you. I am cataloguing the pottery in the Dorset Museum, and in this labour I have come to a little lump (?) about which I wrote to you when it was

found 6 years ago. What struck me then as strange was the existence of 2 (out of originally 3) eyelets in no unusual position. But yesterday on examining the under side more closely than perhaps ever before I find that it is adorned with slight, delicate chevron round the side of the hollow. And on looking carefully at the upper hollow, which is almost covered with sediment of oil (?) I find the chevron there also. Over leaf I have affixed a slight rubbing of a bit of it, enough to show you what it is like. If you are interested in it I would draw the hollow. The curved

surface makes a good rubbing almost or quite impossible. The vessel is a queer one - very different from any within my small experience - Section so.
