interesting and valuable volume



One point has interested me much -
we have suggested that the ~~the~~ highly
ornamented pottery found by Newman
in the Chamber of the Kennet Long
Barrow - may possibly not be the same
^{but} ~~the~~ more age pottery -


This pottery, (of which I think we have
a good many pieces at Dorchester for
the Long Barrow) - has always seemed
to me very like some of the Bronze
age pottery - but I don't quite see
how, if the Long Barrow itself is
of Neolithic age - these heaps of fragments
of pots would have got piled up in the
corners of the Chamber in subsequent

time - but that they were in the Chamber
when found seems clear -

Let me repeat to the ~~Chamber~~ patterns
No 1.  & No 2. 

I notice that you have found several
Rings of urns thus ornamented - I don't
know whether there is anything in an
idea that comes very much into my
(not creating "Drinking Cups") this
ornament is found on the bellows

shaped urns  but not,
or but rarely  on the

ordinary cinerary urns  and that these bellows
urns are a good deal more frequently
