Dear Sir,

I fear you must be rather overdone with inquiries on archaeological matters, but am venturing to apply to you for assistance in some work of my own. My immediate neighbourhood is singularly rich in Roman remains, there being some six and very probably more villa-sites within a 2 mile radius of my house. I am desirous of getting all the information I can concerning similar buildings over a larger district in this country-side, for near me, at least, there seems to be evidence that the villas were mostly, and perhaps all, constructed on a ^{local} distinct plan. It would inflict too long a letter on you to explain this now, but, in case you have not seen it, I am posting with this a paper of mine on a villa which we excavated last year, and on a remarkable set of Roman pewter vessels which I discovered last November. Two other villas near here seem to have had the same ground plan as the printed one: others unluckily have been opened out in time past in an unexpert manner and no plans kept.

I have thought you might be able to tell me whether any villa-sites are

known to yourself in the Salisbury neighbourhood, of which plans have been made and are accessible - The usual thing, e.g. in the instances of West-Dean, Littlecote &c., is to have some record of pavements but no plan of the building.

Another point is this - I have a recollection of reading or hearing of "hypocausts found by you of a rough, inferior description, belonging not to villas but to Romano-British Cottages or huts." In a wood within stone's throw of my house there are very abundant evidences of something in the way of a Romano-British village - Some 10 years ago Mrs C. F. Wood, now of Theddon ^{and herself}, Orange, Allon, then tenant of the Redenhall Estate in which this Copse lies, did a certain amount of exploration there, and among other remains we found a well preserved hypocaust walled with flint blocks - I fear your valuable printed records are not generally accessible - one very greatly suffers for want of knowledge of the work done by others! but perhaps you will most kindly, at your leisure, inform me whether I am correct in the belief that you have found village or hut hypocausts of this description -

In any case pray pardon my troubling you with these questions -
