Dear Sir;

I have had your name mentioned to me by several gentlemen to-day, as being one who takes an interest in old Roman ruins. I have just discovered on some land of mine in Dorchester, a very fine specimen of Tessellated Roman Pavement. As far as I have uncovered at present I have a very fine centrepiece in different colours, square, with a scroll at each corner. The centre of this is then formed into an octagonal - centre & running on the inside of this, is a Black & Red Chain border & inside again, a circle with pretty designs. There are also two splendid Vases or Drags depicted & I should think, when I have finished uncovering, that I shall find a piece of pavement between 30' & 40' square. It is situate on the Victoria Park Estate, Dorchester, immediately at the rear of the Great Western Station & should you care to see it, it will be open for your inspection.
