I hope you will excuse the delay in having your interesting specimens, of probably human remains sent in the papers, examined my friend writes thus concerning

the examination of No. 1 - [There are small dark brown lumps, agglutinated, which seem like matter that has been once soft] When a small rodule of this brown matter was heated on a platinum spatula, it blackened & an odour of burnt feathers was exhaled, the

same matter when treated by
boiling with Caustic Potash
gave off Ammonia.

After heating the same brown
matter in a little water in a
test ^{tube}, it exhibited under the
microscope portions of
amorphous matter of a yellow
or brownish colour & here & there
reddish particles - with numerous
spherical nucleated cells &
round granular cells both
attached to this material
& isolated - also numerous
granules &c -

Several Diatomaceous frustules
& woody fibres were also
visible - From all these facts
& from the general appearance

of these nodules we are warranted
in concluding that the earths
contain a very perceptible
amount of animal matter.

I have just been examining
the two specimens again with
the microscope & find that
No. 2. does not answer so
well to the description as No. 1.
not presenting so many of the
appearances as the latter but
undoubtedly the same kind of stuff.
From what is seen in No. 1.
there is probably the remains of
vegetable as well as animal
matter. I wanted to send
