My dear General Pitt Rivers

We have had no  
frosterization for some time  
I must alter the course of  
things by telling you of a  
partial success at Putland  
among the underground huts.  
I say partial as the hut is  
small and although containing  
Lampets. Permissible + a few  
bees is not large enough to  
have been used as an habitation  
it is only 15.4 high + 3.8 at its  
widest point. The shape is  
"beehive" and constructed with  
moss under the three which had

ben pressing found - By  
the side & about 3 feet from  
the surface was another small  
hollow chamber oval shaped  
also containing shells bones.  
outside were many bones -  
seen. Sharp & and a spindle -  
What. I felt sure a couple  
years of searching after the  
removal of the top soil will
