Dear Sir,

The Committee of the Sunday Society desire to call your attention to the work in which the Society has been engaged for the last thirteen years, and in view of the results which have already been secured and the objects still to be attained they appeal to so well known an advocate of liberal measures as yourself, for some pecuniary aid.

Notwithstanding the generous support accorded to the Society by its subscribers, the demands upon the Committee are ever increasing with the spread of the movement, and additional funds are urgently required in order that the work may be vigorously carried on. The issuing of publications, the holding of meetings, and the opening of Art Exhibitions on Sundays cannot be maintained without considerable expense, and the Committee earnestly appeal for such additional support as will place them more on a footing of equality, as regards finances, with the Sabbatarian Societies, against

which they have to contend not only in the demand for the opening of the National and Municipal Museums, Galleries, and Libraries on Sundays, but for the maintenance of the measure of freedom already secured, and until the National Institutions in the Metropolis are opened on Sundays there should be no halting on the part of the Sunday Society

The Committee have every hope that their appeal for additional help will not be in vain when it is remembered that there is a constantly growing want of places of intellectual resort for the masses on Sundays, owing to the fact that the Board Schools have been sufficiently long in existence to be sending out the young of both sexes, to whom those facilities for elevation and enlightenment which the Sunday Society seeks to provide must prove of inestimable value.

Trusting ^{therefore} that we may receive an encouraging response to this appeal,
