Dear Sir,

I am obliged to you for your letter of the 23rd.inst. The distance from the Post Office at Berwick to the Post Office at Tollard, passing by Rushmore, is 3½ miles. The route is, starting from Berwick, up the Water Street to the west of Winkelbury, across the ridgeway, and over the down, along Rotherley Bottom, and up the North Trot to Rushmore; 2 miles 1333 yards; then down the South Trot, by Munday's Pond and over the hill to Tollard, 1310 yards. This is a good walking road all the way, but when the snow is on the ground, it might sometimes be necessary to turn to the east along the ridgeway, and pass by the North Lodge. This would make the distance from Berwick to Rushmore 927 yards, or about ½ mile, longer; but it would very seldom have to be used.

The only other way from Berwick to Tollard would be by Ashcombe Lane, by Ferne Hollow, and Horse Down Clump, to Tollard. This would be 700 yards shorter, but not so good a road; so that the only addition to the distance caused by passing by Rushmore would be 700 yards on rather a better road.

I am endeavouring to find a man from Berwick for the letters, and will let you know when I hear of one who will take it.
