- D. Antient stonework, topped

with flag stones over the  
portion marked D.

E. E. I think to be behind  
portion of wall, now hidden  
under road.

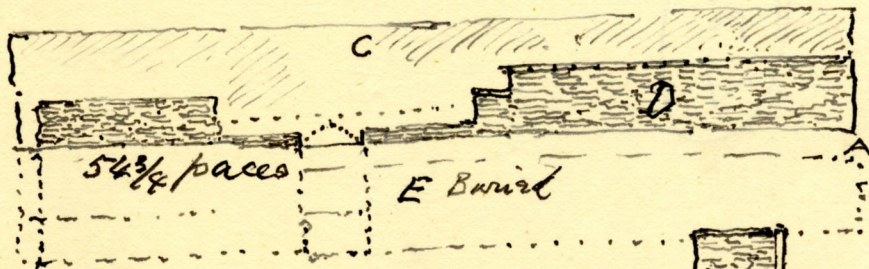
I cannot find any mention
