or two good arrow-heads.

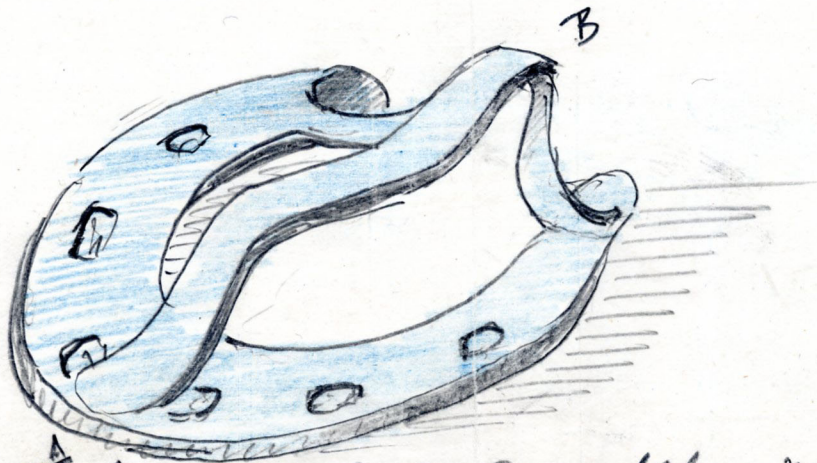
I was down with the
