I am frequently asked by customers, "What is the weight of the uppermost Stone, on each of the enclosed Cromlechs?"

I take the liberty of writing to ask you, what the computed weight is, being informed that they have been measured by your instructions, about 15 or 18 Months ago.

I am <sup>also</sup> told, that the "Pentre Evans Cromlech," is considered to be the finest in Britain, Is that so?

Will you kindly inform me what is the meaning of the "Pen & A Pellets"

on the accompanying sketch. It was found in one of our fields about 12 to 18" under the surface, inscription downwards.

I have had it replaced near to the spot, where I found it. The inscription is now facing the East, as I presume it was formerly before it fell.

There are two other interesting Cromlechs within 5 Miles of the town of Newport Pryn.

If you have not seen the accompanying Historical Sketch of Newport Pryn, by our worthy Rector, would feel pleased if you would accept of it from me.

I apologise for troubling you for the information respecting the Stones named.
