During a recent sojourn
at Southwold, I availed my-
self of the opportunity of in-
specting a ^{heterogeneous} collection belonging
to Mr. Grubbe, for many years
Mayor of the town, & I was
particularly interested in
numerous fragments of
pottery apparently Roman,
which he told me had come
from a pit or well washed

out of the cliff by the sea.

Mr Grubbe kindly gave me his descriptive pamphlet of this find, & as it seemed to me that some affinity existed between these Suffolk pits & those excavated by you at Bushmore, I send you the pamphlet, in case you may not have heard of these Suffolk pits, believing that the description will interest you, although you may not perhaps agree with Mr Grubbe's theory of their use.

I should have said that among the pottery were pieces of a greenish glazed ware which I hardly thought of the same age as the others, but I was told that a competent archaeologist had decided that they were Roman — One piece was a portion of a very large jar or amphora, in reddish ware, the handle very wide & the neck small.
