Sir

I have the honour to reply to your Letter of inquiry relating to Isaac Bennett, and to inform you that after James Elliott was discharged from custody at Salisbury <sup>Quarter Sessions</sup> on Wednesday last, I saw him in company of Isaac Bennett, and the Witnesses Hiscock, Frampton and Inkpen who gave evidence for Elliott's defence, they were laughing and talking together and appeared to understand each other, just as if nothing had happened between them, I spoke to Elliott afterwards relative Isaac Bennett, and he told me that he should not open on Bennett, as the job was over and it would do no good to himself or Bennett. I am clearly of an opinion that neither can say anything one against the other without involving themselves, I am quite convinced that one knows too much for the other,
