## CHURCH + FURNITURE + AND CLERGY + CLOTHING.

From "The Bristol Times and Mirror," Jan. 25th, 1886.

Some few weeks ago we visited the firm of Messrs. G. Tonkin and Sons, of Park-street viaduct, who were then busy with church decorations for the Christmas festival; but they do not confine themselves to festival decorations only. The business is such an extensive one, and the departments are so numerous, that we cannot attempt to give even a summary of them in the small space at our disposal; it must suffice for us to state that this enterprising church firm supply everything that is used in the sacred building, whether made in art metal, wood, marble or stone. Either a polished brass eagle lectern can be obtained, or the smallest article used upon the communion table; and these may be understood to include embroideries: tapestries, hangings, mural decorations; lighting appliances, and materials for ladies' own work; all of which can be viewed and selected on the premises. Messrs. Tonkin are licensed dealers in church plate: but we must not omit their connection with their ever-increasing clergy clothing department, which has been carried on in our city for nearly half a century. The skill of the firm as cutters of clerical coats and cassocks has such a wide repute, and is well known, that no comment is needed. Messrs. Tonkin are clerical hatters, and their establishment is famed for the correct clerical shapes. and thoroughly well-dyed hats. The "Cathedral" collar, registered, is almost universally worn in clerical circles, and is said to be the best clergy stock that has ever been introduced. The firm's premises at Parkstreet viaduct, are filled with goods that form excellent presentations to either the church or the officiating ministers thereof, and are of value both for use and ornament. From the numerous testimonies given, we observe the clergy generally express themselves highlysatisfied with the services of the above firm in all departments.

BATH AND WEST OF ENGLAND SHOW, BRISTOL MEETING, JUNE 1886.

[ARTS + DEPARTMENT.]

One of the most attractive stands in the Arts Department is that of the local firm of Messrs George Tonkin and Sons, of Park Street Viaduct. It consists of a variety of church furniture, ecclesiastical art needle-work, and samples of materials for clergy clothing and choir outfits. The mediaval metal work, especially the brass eagle lectern, is very fine, and entirely hand polished. The designs in wood are carefully executed, the eagle lectern being a capital specimen of wood-carving. Amongst the metal and wood work are several church furnishing requisites, such as Glastonbury chairs, priedieux, lamps and lighting appliances, boards for hymns and notices, font buckets and jugs, plain and slightly carved lectorns, pocket fonts, communion sets, candlesticks, vases and crosses for the altar, and processional crosses. The latter and some of the vases are handsomely illuminated. A table the size of an altar has been arranged towards the top, and this is made very attractive by a beautiful red satin frontal, the centrepiece and orphreys of which, as well as the super frontal, are elegantly worked and fringed. The ornaments hereon are of the best, and the vases are filled with choice natural flowers. A side glass case contains a range of embroidered stoles, a bishop's mitre in white satin with gold fringe and crosses, book-marks, alms-bags, &c. Another glass case is filled with silver and glass goods, flagons, cruets, patens, pocket fonts, and communion sets, tiny crosses and vases, candlesticks, &c. A third case is arranged with burses and veils, tastefully embroidered; centrepieces for frontals, alms-bags, Masonic clothing and fringes. In addition there are shown hats and caps of every description, as worn by the clergy, and the exhibition patterns of materials for clergy clothing are bound and got up with completeness. Photographs of the Bishop of Lincoln, vested in rochet, stole, cope, and mitre, framed and coloured; and photos of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, the late Bishop of Manchester, Dr. Frazer, the new Bishop, Dr. Moorhouse, and some of the clergy, and the Prince of Wales in Masonic costume, come in for a fair share of notice. Mr F. D. Tonkin, of the firm, has been in attendance the first two days, supported by Mr Chas. J. Tonkin and qualified assistants, as the space occupied is a large one.
