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# Antiquities add<sup>d</sup>

1. Two <sup>side</sup> tables supported by Stone Panthers & claws Copies of antique marble ditto in the Louvre Museum N<sup>o</sup>. 1010. one is surmounted with white marble Slab having inserted in large Bronze letters the word S'ALVE.
2. Small white marble Torso of Cupid about 15 inches high (Parian) from the Biscari Museum, Catania.
3. Three Roman Terra Cotta Tiles with Bas-reliefs of Figures, Vases, foliage &c. &c.
4. An ancient Inscription of the 12<sup>th</sup> Century recording in fourteen Hexameter rhyming Latin ~~ten~~ lines  
the

the building of the Podesta's Palace  
Gothic letters. - (Biscari Museum.)

5. Bas relief fragment much corroded  
of a Sarcophagus with four Roman  
soldiers (Hastati) almost unique  
as shewing their costume. -
6. Small Torso of Athlete, Parian  
marble from Biscari Museum. -
7. A very fine Bust of Caracalla  
brought from Italy by Late  
Lord Besborough - from the  
Villa at Roehampton. -
8. A large marble Mask of a  
Faun forming a Fountain by  
Sansovino. obtained in Venice. -

it.- There are Nine Statues in  
high relief out of the original twelve  
which surrounded the Tomb-  
male & female, Apollo, Bacchus  
~~for~~<sup>for</sup> - the other three being  
lost or broken in the excavation.  
In order to transport them they  
have been detached and are now  
in separate masses about four  
feet high. Each figure stands  
in a Niche with alternate  
triangular and semicircular  
Pediments supported by ~~two~~  
Spirally fluted Corinthian or  
Composite Columns marking  
the period which ~~is~~ is of the

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A Basso Reliefs of a Priest of Bacchus  
in Parian Marble of life size recently  
~~obtained~~ brought from Naples by the  
late Signor Pinti at a great expense.  
It is supposed to have come from the  
Biscari Museum in Catania, Sicily,  
where it existed from the Sixteenth  
Century. This genuine work of  
Art is of dignified character would  
be well worth a place in any collection  
and under the circumstances can  
be sold (with the background filled  
<sup>if desired.</sup> in) for a quarter of what it cost.—

2<sup>nd</sup> A Roman Sepulchral Tablet  
dedicated by Calpurnia Concordia  
to

to her husband J. Clodius Fam=arius. - It has a saucer & in the centre pierced with holes for the libations & incense. - It has in all probability covered a funereal urn in some ancient Palumbarium.

3<sup>o</sup> Two antique statues of Muses draped to the feet of small life size. One in Greek Pentelic marble - the other in Parian or Luna marble without the head. -

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There has also recently arrived in London a magnificent Sar-Cophagus or Monument discovered a few months since in the ancient Province of Caria in Asia Minor and imported from Smyrna at an expence of transport over the mountains of £360. -- in the hope that the British museum w<sup>o</sup> purchase it. - The authorities however while admitting its perfectly genuine character declined it on the ground of having no spare funds, and of already possessing many similar or better ones. - No other persons have seen it

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Septimius Severus and Constantine the Great: but although so late it is an unusually good work of the period being of correct and noble design & proportions.

It is of white Parian marble or at least of that unknown Asiatic marble of which the Apollo Belvedere & the Venus de Medici are supposed to have been made, the Roman quarries of Luni not having then been discovered.

As the expense of re-exporting these marbles will not ~~in all~~ likely be incurred they will have to be sold at an immense loss, not very creditable to English taste

taste if the facts were known  
but offering a good chance to  
a private purchaser. — The  
Nine figures arranged round  
a hall w<sup>th</sup> of themselves alone  
form a small gallery. —
