gradually towards the nose
and having a slight
& arch peculiar to
these villages, and are
not represented as far
as I know in Mushtakor,
of Pebular from elsewhere
you probably know
Kam Hill. a portion of
a long range of Neolithic
earthworks (Bord Daithi)
adopted and occupied
by the Romans.
I have for the last fifty
years been a collector
of finds from them and
I take the liberty of
enclosing you photos
of some of the usual
type of Pebular from

them - Are they not similar
to those you speak of
from Rokerly &c?
Enclose one or two
other photos, which may
interest you - if so. do
me the favour to accept
them - The first few
flints - Are they arrow
heads or are they amulets,
would they sharpen them
for striking into the
shaft with certainty of
splintering it? Mr Edwd
Cunnington says he
has generally found
them in settlements -

Roman "Stylus" for writing on waxed tablet ("tabula"). The flat end was used for erasing what had been written & smoothing the wax for writing again - hence "vertere stylum" was a proverbial expression - our word "style" derived from it. primarily applied to character of writing.

The Eagle (or Dove) is very puzzling. The work looks Roman, but the screw holes "gives it a modern appearance". Sir A W Franks "may be medieval, not Roman". C. J. Evans "uncertain. Should say, Roman". Canon Greenwell "Possibly Roman, after introduction of Christianity" "The top of a banner pole for religious ceremony" A. G. Wright
