found some Anglo Roman
'crucibles' in the British
Museum that appear to
be ^{about} identical in size,
& shape with those
found in the 'pits'
on the site of the Anglo
Iron' at Oxford. Mr. Reid
told me they that some

came from Lincoln
or its neighborhood, & the
others from Cannon
St. in the City.

Those called Medicines
(in another room) are
much larger, & coarser.

But, on subsequently
visiting the Southwell
Museum, I found both
