My dear General.

After writing to you this morning I walked up to the Chase woods.

I therefore found my woodmen and buyers of wood in much consternation at your benclosing, & presumed, closing of the cross rides in your woods.

For centuries we have possessed the uninterrupted right of hauling our wood through your coverts to Farnham & Hambledon Clettle, formerly by the old chase walks & recently for 30 years through your shooting rides, which

welcome to it, and I will find out
what route it will be best for your
~~WHAT I HAD TOLD~~
cart to take. In the direction of
Green Close Farm, the passage through my
wood would be no convenience whatever
to you as the road by Bloody Shot Gate
is as near as any that could be got
through the ridges, but in the direction of
Brookswood Common it might be a
convenience to you and I will look at
the ground with that object. The question
of the wood is I apprehend totally
different from that of the common,
the one is private property, the other is
property subject to a right of way.

Dear Farquharson,

As I said in my last letter I
am willing to accept the route you
propose over Main Down, but the
additional price in Mr's Costleman's
land will be an additional expense
beyond what the cost of the road would
be to Bloody Shot Gate.

Whichever road there is in
consequence of that change I should
expect you to share, the new road
being proposed by you ~~and~~ as you

say ~~order~~ with a view of shelving the
question of right.

I have a right to pass from Bloody
Shot Gate to the ~~head~~ ^{head} of the road on the
other side of the Down and I believe also to
the gate which you have shut, but the road
you have now prepared will answer my
purpose and ward off any difficulty
in so far as I am personally concerned,
that is to say I should not press for my
rights in any other direction. The question
would be shelved but I should do it
without prejudice to any other rights that
I or the public might possess across
Mani Down.

As to the way across the strips of wood
called Gore Coppice I am ~~not~~ not aware
of any right existing across those pieces

of wood on the part of the public.
The question has never before been
voiced, whereas the right across
Mani Down has ~~been~~ frequently
asserted. If you have any right
across my property, I no doubt have
the same right for the same reason
across yours. I should doubt there
being any actual right on either side
across the property of the other.
I am planning the ends of my rides
in this Coppice not more than 100
to 120 yards long in order to
screen in the new ride that I am
making. If you want permission
to pass across ~~of~~ the wood as a
matter of convenience, you are
