I was much interested to see at Burlington House on St George's day your new volume containing an account of excavations on the Wansdyke and the more so as I have lately been taking measurements of some earthworks on my property here in Balcombe Forest which from their form and character I am inclined to think may be also British. I enclose tracings of part of the plan I have made of them (which is not yet complete) and of three sections showing the present contour. Perhaps you may think them likely to be worth inspection. If so I should esteem it an honour if you would pay me a visit here and allow me to add as you please to them.

I must tell you — there is always some one who "minds the biggin' o't" — that some of the oldest men about here say that these banks "were thrown up for the rabbits"


The plan and sections which I enclose will probably enable you to judge how far this is a reasonable suggestion.




But after May when the bracken gets up these banks are not so well seen as they are just now.
