

I have no doubt you saw
the correspondence on Stonehenge
in the Times. Capt Oliver wishes
some works of preservation and
restoration undertaken, and I advised
him to write to you on the subject.
I think it would be a good thing
to set up the fallen stones, dig out
the whole area (as it would be done
under your supervision) very carefully,
fill it in with concrete and cover the
concrete with asphalt. If let alone
after that it would stand 10,000 years.

In conclusion I must congratulate
you on the good work you are doing as a
landowner with your museum, grounds,
band, &c.

Dear General Pitt Rivers
I have now completed
reading the third volume of your
magnificent work, which you
have been so kind as to send me.

Like its two predecessors it is a
model of what such books should
be. The word model reminds
me that your remarks upon those
you have had constructed are of
special interest to me, but I cannot
understand what reason you had for

adopting such scales as 13 feet
to 1 inch and $2\frac{1}{3}$ feet to 1 inch,
while, on the other hand, I can
hardly suppose you adopted them
without some good reason.

Your suggestion that
Bokerley Dyke might possibly have
been erected as a game drive
reminds me of certain works in some
of the valleys in the west of the Isle
of Wight which are called British
Villages on the ordnance map, but
which Petrie thought were for driving
game. They seemed to me more
suited for that, but I could hardly think
the island would hold game enough

to make it worth while to construct
such works. In your district this
difficulty (if it be one) would disappear.
I am sending by bookpost a copy of
a note on them from the Journal of
the Anthropol. Inst. I have not
sent you copies of other papers printed
therein as I know you get them in the
Journal, ^(and 25 copies soon get disposed of) but I am sending copy of a
paper on Stone Circles from the
Archaeological Journal (read last
April), and a copy of my earliest
paper on the question of the Pharoah
of the Exodus. This question has been
discussed in the Times lately, but the
supporters of the ~~orthodox~~ usual Ramses
& Acheron theory seem disposed to let
judgment go against them by default.
